

Celebrating a rich legacy

he lives of thousands of young women in the South have been touched by influence of the Holy Faith Sisters through the ministry of education.

In 1966, at the invitation of Father David Oliveire, the then Parish Priest of Penal, the Holy Faith Sisters embarked upon the offering of secondary school education to the young girls in Penal and its environs. This service was to cater, primarily for those who were denied places in the existing secondary schools, based on the common entrance examination.

From very humble and modest beginnings on October 1, 1966, with an enrolment of 24 students and a staff of two teachers and a principal, the school can today boast of a school population of 689 students and a teaching staff of 52.

The Holy Faith Sisters, whose charisma linked them closely with the poor, were entrusted with the responsibility of setting up and running the school. Sister Celeste was the first principal who was later succeeded by Sister Evangelista and by Sister Columba. In these early years, they faced the challenges of limited finance and lack of space. As word got around about the quality education that was being offered, the demand for school places became greater. Under skilful management and dedicated service, the school as a private institution mushroomed with the development of the physical plant and with the broadening of the curriculum.

The 1980s could be considered a period of expansion. Sister Columba, the then principal and Vinode Jhagroo, vice-principal, worked together to build a school not only in terms of the physical plant and the curriculum, but in developing and nurturing young minds, through the provision of an education whose objective was holistic development.

Significant development took place in 1988, when the school became Government assisted. The curriculum was further broadened and more staff was granted by the ministry of education, who also assisted with school grants to aid physical expansion.

The year 1991, saw the retirement of Sister Columba Byrne who was principal for 13 years and under whose leadership much of the development took place.

Sister Columba and Jhagroo were succeeded by Valerie Bethel as principal and Sandra Corbie as vice-principal respectively, who together with the hardworking staff and supportive parents of the PTA have been committed to keeping pace with the trend set in earlier years.

A steady increase has been noted over the years in the number of students gaining full CXC passes.

Students continue to excel in academic performance. This made urgent the need for providing A' level tuition for the many students who were well qualified and seeking A' level places.

Corbie was succeeded by Angela Young Lai, Marilyn Brown and Norma James as vice-principal. Laura Boyce acted as vice-principal, until Nadine Victor-Ayers was appointed in 2020. Bethel was succeeded by Sharon Francois as principal in 2014.

Today, Holy Faith Convent, Penal would not have been the success story that it is, were it not for the hard work of the past administrators, parents, teachers, benefactors and all those responsible for bequeathing a rich legacy to the present Holy Faith

Every year at Holy faith Convent Penal, we honour Margaret Aylward by having a Thanksgiving Mass in October as well as singing our tribute songs, Polar Star and Woman of Faith. We also encourage our students to emulate her moral virtues in their pursuit for social justice.


her life and contributions to society are not only a testament of her strength of character, but also to the powerful chord her message struck among many around the world.



Building a Vision

uring the school's Silver Jubilee, an interview was conducted with principal, Sr Columba Byrne, who served from 1978 to 1991. She highlighted some of the problems she faced relating to the Physical Environment. These included overcrowded classes, lack of a library, study room, hall and laboratory and additionally, very little equipment. She dreamt of expansion of the physical plant into a modern, well equipped facility with an unsurpassed academic offering. This was extremely necessary because of the growing numbers who wanted to attend the school which by the 1980's was already distinguished for providing quality education grounded on religious values.

Throughout the years, the hard work and dedication of administration, staff and stakeholders have resulted in the fruition of Sr Columba's vision.

It is through God that Holy Faith Convent, Penal continues to grow from strength to strength. Our vision includes further physical expansion beyond our present boundaries. We look towards completion of our many projects such as the Language Lab, Music and Technical Drawing rooms. This global pandemic has emphasized the importance of technology and our goal focused towards updating and expanding our ICT Department and Library equipment. The construction of an auditorium has been an ongoing vision and we continue to work diligently, trusting in God for its manifestation. We believe that through Faith, this goal will be accomplished.







As a parent of a child with special needs there are various concerns, faced daily, but the amazingly kind, supportive and dedicated staff at HFC, Penal quickly quelled most of our fears. On a daily basis they made sure Faith's needs were met, classes were easily accessible to her, and she was included in all programs and festivities held at the school. The staff ensured that students were enlightened about Faith being born with Spinal Bifida (a birth defect in which an area of the spinal column doesn't form properly, leaving a section of the spinal cord and spinal nerves exposed through an opening in the back) and through lectures and assemblies they realized that the best gift to give someone with a disability is your friendship and to include them and believe in them. Being a student with Tourette's Syndrome, (a condition that affects the brain and nerves, causing people to make repeated movements and sounds the teachers at the school were willing to learn about my condition in order to make my settling in as comfortable as possible and I enjoyed the kindness and acceptance of my fellow students. I engaged in not only studies but also extra-curricular activities. I achieved passes in all my subjects for CXC and continued to pursue my A'Levels at the School in 2001. I was accepted at the University of the West Indies, St Augustine, where I pursued a BA in History, with Minors in HR Management and Communication Studies. I worked in the Library field after that, where I developed an interest in research. In 2011 I was awarded a Government Scholarship to pursue my Masters in Library and Information Science to become a qualified Librarian. My achievements would not have been possible without the unwavering support I received from my teachers and classmates throughout my studies at HFC, Penal, which provided me with the foundation and skills I needed to succeed in my career.



ALEISHA-MAY ELBOURNE

(1980 - 1985)

Aleisha-May was diagnosed with Semi Spastic Cerebral Palsy, at an early age. This is a developmental disorder caused by damage to the brain before birth. This condition prevents the normal development of motor function, as such Aleisha-May's muscles are tight and stiff and do not move smoothly. She had some difficulties with speech and it was almost impossible for her to write.

However, she found a safe haven at Holy Faith Convent, Penal. She never felt excluded from school life. She recalled singing with Mr Asford Joseph and being a part of the prayer group as well as visiting the Home for the Aged.

The tremendous support from her mother and grandmother coupled with the support from the staff and students made her into the person she is today. She was able to

attain six subjects over a three year period with a transcriber and supervisor from the ministry of education. While she is proud of this, she explained that she is most proud of her holistic development at Holy Faith Convent and the values inculcated in her to be a better citizen and to never give up despite her challenges.
